Meet Our NEW Regional Educator, Katie Mulverhill!

Hello! My name is Katie Mulverhill, and I am happy to announce that I have joined the staff of the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation in late November as an Environmental Educator I. While I will cover the entire Central Region, my office is at the Central Region Headquarters at Clark Reservation. I look forward to working with the Council of Park Friends and sharing my experience, knowledge and love of nature with you all!

I graduated from SUNY ESF with a degree in Environmental and Forest Biology and a concentration in Nature Interpretation. After graduation I had the pleasure of interning at Beaver Lake Nature Center,

Rogers Environmental Education Center, and the Illinois State Museum. When I returned to CNY I joined the seasonal staff at Beaver Lake. Most recently I was the Education Manager at Baltimore Woods Nature Center and worked with their Nature in the City program where I got to introduce elementary students from the City of Syracuse to the nature that they could find in their own neighborhood. It was such a satisfying experience.

Now I get to spread my wings even further and venture into some new territory. I will have many new things to experience, from the Envi-

ronmental Field Days at Green Lakes, to the NYS Fair, working with SUNY ESF's Environmental Education program, and doing programs across the region! I hope to see you at one at Clark Reservation! you would use in your own home, with modern safety features and automatic shut-off.



What's in a name...



The Switchback Trail (ST on the map),

our newest, connects the Big Buck Trail to the Long Trail a hundred yards or so from the Cliff Trail. This tenth of a mile trail passes through one of the most beautiful glens in the park. From the pines at the western edge to the moss

covered rocks in the east this trail epitomizes the sublime peacefulness that is Clark Reservation.



ask the experts >>>

• What is Pale Swallow-wort?

Pale swallow-wort was likely introduced for ornamental purposes and was first collected in Monroe and Nassau counties in New York State in 1897. A New York study on grassland birds indicated that as swallow-wort cover increases, grassland bird presence declines. In Central New York, pale swallow-wort is displacing the federally listed Hart's tongue fern (Asplenium scolopendrium) at one site and poses a threat to additional populations in the state (www.nps.gov/plants/alien).







our native garden>>>

The Native Garden at the entrance to the Nature Center is a never ending work of love. With the guidance of our resident horticulturist and long standing CPF member Deb Shanahan, we are working to maintain this unique example of our woodland habitat. This garden plan was developed by Plant CNY in 2006 to highlight the

unique ecological history of Clark Reservation by using only those plant species native to the reservation. It is designed to look like a part of Clark Reservation thorough the use of boulders and stone indicative of the park, while maintaining a sense of individuality within the park. This aesthetically pleasing living display has 4 seasons of interest, creates microhabitats through the use of layered plantings, uses topography and boulders to create shaded niches and uti-

lizes plants attractive to but-

terflies and wildlife.
